**1. Artemide: Series Y**

In collaboration with Gensler, Artemide designed Series Y to create a meaningful connection between people and space. This fixture gives the user complete freedom to create personalized compositions in both horizontal and vertical configurations.

**2. FLOS: Wiring**

This sculptural light is a crossover wall and floor lamp designed in collaboration between FLOS and Italian artist duo Andrea Trimarchi and Simone Farresin of Formafantasma. The light incorporates a custom-made electric cable made from colored rubber and a ring of LEDs, which intentionally displays the transmission of energy that is often hidden in lighting.

**3. Vibia: Palma**

Designed by Antoni Arola, the Palma light was inspired by hanging gardens and the idea of bringing nature indoors. The light is meant to illuminate plants generally associated with natural daylight and features a simple LED light filtered by two blown opal glass half spheres joined together by a ring of aluminum.

**4. Sonneman: Wave Bar**

The Wave Bar by Sonneman features undulating pieces of translucent acrylic layers lit by an extruded LED light bar. When illuminated, light outlines the edges of the waves and is refracted by the frosted surfaces of the acrylic. The pendant is available in two different lengths, making it ideal for clustering numerous together.

**5. Cerno: Lenis**

Inspired by a boat that the Cerno founders built as childhood friends in one of their Southern California backyards, the company debuted the Lenis light at ICFF last year. Representing an aesthetic deviation for Cerno, the linear light features soft lines, pronounced curves, and a subtle reminder of the ocean.
